Success in your journey with First Steps, depends on your...

- CONSISTENCY: Each week you will go through three days of lessons. By the end of the week, you will need to have completed the three days and be prepared to discuss the answers with your mentor or small group leader. The lessons themselves should take about 30 minutes to complete, with the lessons on Day 1 being the longest.
- CONTROL: Learning good study habits is crucial for growing. Do NOT skip any or some of the lessons. If life becomes too busy and you do not have your work done, please do not skip the material. Each day builds on the previous day, so take your time and finish each lesson.
- COMPANIONSHIPS: Do NOT try to complete this journey on your own. Relationships with other believers will prove essential to understanding the journey of moving from membership to discipleship.

introduction

Our starting point - Is there real evidence?

We are so excited that you have begun your journey as a disciple of Jesus Christ. We have dedicated our lives to aiding others in understanding who Jesus is, what He came for, and how we can assist Him in His mission. Our hope is that through this devotional workbook, you, too, will grow in your desire to pursue Jesus Christ with everything you've got!

It is our hope that even though our backgrounds and stories are different, you will see, through our experiences, that we are on this journey together.

JIM'S JOURNEY: From history to His-story

I started as a pastor's son in a Christian home. My parents were sincere, faithful followers of Jesus, but because sin entered into my life at a very young age, guilt and shame isolated me from them and from God. I sought to cover my shame and pain through drugs, alcohol, and sex. These left deep scars and addictions in my life. When I went to college, the professors taught me that there was no God, and that I was the product of evolutionary forces – a mere animal with instincts. I believed them and walked away from any form of a spiritual life.

When sin consumed my life and left me absolutely empty and alone, God heard the prayers of my parents and began to draw me back.

First, my father sent me books that were written by scientists that believed in God. I had been taught that to be educated meant you did not believe in the supernatural. I found the truth was that many scientists believed in God, and in fact, that science itself had proven that the world had to be designed. I began reading quotes by world famous scientists. I studied countless books, and my research led me to quotes like these:

"It is my science that drove me to the conclusion that the world is much more complicated than can be explained by science. It was only through the supernatural that I can understand the mystery of existence."

"The best data we have are exactly what I would have predicted had I nothing to go on but the first five books of Moses, the Psalms, and the Bible as a whole." - Arno Penzias, a Nobel Prize winning scientist

(Note - The first five books of Moses are the first five books of the Old Testament: Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy)

As I came to this realization, it did not mean I believed in the Christian God, only that I was open to belief of a god.

Next, my father sent me books from noted historians claiming that the only religion that could be proved historically was Christianity. At first, I scoffed at this, but my father challenged me to look into why these historians claimed this. After some time, I began my own journey to discover if what they said was true. This journey both surprised me and changed the course of my life.

Until this time, I had always believed that the story of the Bible had been changed over time. I discovered that this was not true. Great historians believe that the Bible was written by men who walked with Jesus, and it is the same today as when it was written. I read great works by Dr. John T. Robinson of Cambridge University and Sir Fredrick G. Kenyon, Chief Librarian of the British Museum. Scholars like these men helped me see that there was actual educational research to support the Bible and what it says.

Other people had told me that the writers of the New Testament lied about what happened so that they could become famous and rich. However, as I studied that claim, I found that history proves this untrue. Every one of the New Testament writers suffered for their faith. They lost their possessions, their reputations, and in many cases, they watched those they loved die for their beliefs.

This led me to ask a very powerful question, "What would cause someone to passionately promote something with nothing in return except misery and even death?" I found that the writers of the New Testament were different than writers of any other religion in history. The writers of other religions became wealthy, prominent, and powerful, but not the first followers of Jesus.

These early Christ followers were persecuted in the following ways:

Luke was hung on an olive tree in Greece by a pagan priest.

James, the brother of John, was beheaded in 44 A.D.

Philip was scourged, thrown into prison, and then crucified in 54 A.D.

Matthew was run through with a sword in 60 A.D.

James, the brother of Jesus, was beaten with a club and then stoned.

Mathias was stoned and then beheaded.

Andrew, the brother of Peter, was crucified.

Mark was dragged to pieces by horse.

Peter was crucified upside down.

Jude was crucified in Edessa in 72 A.D.

Bartholomew was beaten and then crucified.

Thomas was run through with a spear.

Simon was crucified in 74 A.D.

Barnabas was hung in 73 A.D.

John was banished to an island to die isolated and alone.

The more I studied history, the more evidence emerged. I found the truth, or rather the truth found me. Without wavering, I fully believe Jesus is the Son of God, and that He came to tell us the truth from God's perspective. He came to tell us where we came from, how the world got this way, and what God wants us to do about it. He came to tell us that He loves us, and where we are going after we die.

Jesus came to shed light on a dark world by offering you a relationship with Himself. I am hopeful that as you go through this book you will come to understand the truth in a way that gives you hope and purpose. I continue my journey walking with God because I fully believe that the Bible is the truth. I have experienced a relationship with God unlike anything I could have imagined. I am so thankful He changed my story. I pray, hope, and believe you will let Him change yours as well.

BRANDON'S JOURNEY: Discipleship is a process

One of the things my dad taught me was how to hunt. At first, I just followed him as we hiked through the woods. I watched how he used different tools like binoculars or a knife. I learned how to read the terrain and what kinds of habitat held certain species of animals. After I got a little older, he allowed me to start carrying a gun and hunt alongside him. Before too long, I was off on my own. I began putting into practice all the skills that he modeled for me, and soon I became a successful hunter. Today, I am teaching my own children outdoor hunting principles that they can use.

One thing I have learned in the process of becoming a successful hunter is the more I learn, the less I really know. I don't know everything there is to know about hunting. While I consider myself a good hunter, I haven't mastered all the outdoorsman skills necessary to become a great hunter. I continue to do the things I've learned from my dad, but I also attempt new things in my desire to become better. It is this process, though, that brings hunting to life for me. The process of learning, growing, and passing on the skills and knowledge I have is vital to those I get to share the outdoors with, especially my children.

So how will you become a disciple? Similar to the example of my dad modeling hunting for me, we need a person to model for us what a disciple should look like. God uses relationships to help us grow, and become the disciple He intended. Christianity was never designed to be done alone; everyone needs someone to walk with him on the journey. In fact, having a group of concerned and compassionate people walking with us is even better! Jesus gave us this example in the Bible with His disciples. He called out several men to live life with Him for a period of time while He was here on earth.

First Steps follows the relationship example Jesus had with His disciples. This is why it's vitally important that you utilize First Steps with another person. A good choice would be the person who led you to Christ, or your small group leader. Throughout this book, we will call this person your mentor. Decide together a time and place – preferably weekly – to meet and discuss what you are learning. Remember, when two or three are gathered in Jesus name, He promises to be there also.

What do I need to know about the Bible?

It is true and without error

The Bible is God's direct word to us, and was written by human authors who were under the supernatural guidance of the Holy Spirit. The Bible is the supreme source of truth for Christian beliefs and living. The truths of the Bible guide us and help us grow in our faith. We need the Bible. We can trust that the Bible is true and has no error in it because it is from God.

It contains many books in two major sections

The Bible is divided into two major parts, the Old and New Testament. The Old Testament was mostly written in Hebrew, and consists of 39 different books. It was written before Christ came to earth as a man, and tells about the history of the Jews. God's Son, the Messiah, Jesus Christ, comes from Jewish lineage. The Old Testament also includes prophecies about Jesus and the end times. Jesus has already fulfilled many of these prophecies, and we continue to see Old Testament prophecies come to pass today.

The New Testament begins after a 400-year silent period from God. It consists of 27 books, and was originally written in Greek. The first four books of the New Testament are called the Gospels. These books tell us about the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The rest of the New Testament gives us the history of the early church, letters from the apostles to the first churches, and insight into the end of time.

There are various versions of the Bible

So, now that you have the background, it's time to buy your own Bible. What do you think you're going to find? Well, to be honest, you may find yourself a little overwhelmed! There are many different Bible versions out there.

Let's talk about the difference between a translation and a paraphrase first. A translation of the Bible is when the words are taken from the original languages in which they were written and translated to the English language. There is obviously a little author interpretation in even a translation of the Bible, but the intent is to stay as close to the original language as possible.

A paraphrase takes an English translation of the Bible, and interprets it into an even easier, reader-friendly form. You should not use a paraphrase for in depth Bible study, but it can be helpful when you need clarity about what something means in simpler wording.

It may be helpful to own a paraphrase to use when you want to simply read the Bible, and a translation to use for reading and studying.

Below are some examples of English language translations and paraphrases that are popular today:

Some Bibles have different features

In addition to the different versions, there are different types of Bibles available. Study Bibles have extra study guides included. In some Bibles, the words spoken by Jesus are printed in red ink. Large print Bibles are available, and there are even Bibles divided into daily reading plans.

The Bible is available online and in mobile apps

There are many apps and websites that you can use to read and study the Bible as well. These often include a variety of translations and paraphrases. Many offer daily reading plans, highlighting and sharing options, and some will even read out loud to you! A few good options are YouVersion.com and BibleGateway.com

week 1 - the problem: how did we get here?

The other day I was talking to a woman about God. She refused to even consider the facts about His existence. She believed that if there is a God, He wouldn't allow all the pain in the world. As I began to probe into her perspective, she shared that she had been abused by her father and ignored by her mother. The grandmother that had really cared for her died of cancer. She went on to talk about wars and hunger all around the world. Her conclusion? No God.

It's true that we are born into a broken world. All you have to do is look around, and you can see it. So how does this fit with a good, all-powerful God? That is what this chapter is about. Our hope is that you will discover how the world got to be this way. It is also our hope that you will see this temporary world for what it is—beautiful and broken at the same time.

day 1: ADAM'S CHOICE: SIN

God created a perfect and beautiful planet for us. He crafted a brightly shining sun, a softly glowing moon and set twinkling lights overhead. The seas were teeming with life. He filled the earth with rich soil, lush greenery, delicious fruit, and majestic animals. He designed a lovely garden where we could live in absolute peace with Him and with each other. So what happened? Adam chose to sin. In its simplistic sense, sin is doing exactly what God instructs us not to do, or not doing what He instructs us to do.

One of God's greatest demonstrations of His love for you is the gift of 'choice.' God gives us the option of choosing whom we would follow. From the beginning, God wanted us to choose him, but ultimately it was our choice. Unfortunately Adam chose sin and sin set into motion the destruction of God's perfect world. In choosing sin, Adam severed our personal relationship with God.

And evening passed and morning came, marking the second day.

⁹ Then God said, "Let the waters beneath the sky flow together into one place, so dry ground may appear." And that is what happened. ¹⁰ God called the dry ground "land" and the waters "seas." And God saw that it was good.

When things are as they were created to be, everything is good. God said several times that His creation was good. The light, the dry ground and the waters, the vegetation, the sun, moon and stars, the birds and fish, the animals, and man and woman were all deemed good by God. At Creation, the world was orderly and beautiful. God and man enjoyed a close relationship, and the relationship between Adam and Eve was intimate and safe.

So, what caused the world to start the process of dying and corruption? Before we get into that, let's lay out some truths. God is life. He is not only the creator, but also the sustainer of life.

The Father has life in himself, and he has granted that same life-giving power to his Son.

What do these verses tell us about God's power?

God has great power! He is the all-powerful God. He can grant life and take it away. God is also a relational God, and He allows us to choose to love and obey Him. He created us in His image—to be relational beings. He chose us and wanted us to choose Him too. Adam and Eve decided to listen to the enemy and to their own desires rather than trust and obey God.

This^[a] is the key to your life. And if you love and obey the Lord, you will live long in the land the Lord swore to give your ancestors Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob."

How does Deuteronomy 30:15-20 speak to God's desire for us to choose Him?

When we reject Jesus, we refuse a relationship with God, and we are condemned to live in the earthly consequences of this world for eternity. This choice keeps us separated from God. Romans 5:12 says, *"When Adam sinned, sin entered the world. Adam's sin brought death, so death spread to everyone, for everyone sinned."* When we choose to sit on the thrones of our own lives, we choose to reject God for who He is. Remember, God is creator and sustainer of life. If we choose to be separated from life, we will surely die.

A modern day example of this is the cell phone. As long as it's on the charger, the charge holds. The moment it is taken off the charger, the battery begins to die.

Thank God there is good news in spite of all of this! In the next section, you will understand that when we accept Jesus, we become beloved children of God! We are restored into a full and fruitful relationship with Him.

day 2: GOD'S CHOICE: LOVE

When Jesus came to the earth, He came to reveal the heart of God to a lost world. Because of sin and separation, the world did not understand the heart of God. Jesus explained, through stories, God's perspective of the world, and how it got that way. One such story, as recorded in Luke 15:10-32, has become renowned as *The Prodigal Son:*

"In the same way, there is joy in the presence of God's angels when even one sinner repents."

¹¹ To illustrate the point further, Jesus told them this story: "A man had two sons. ¹² The younger son told his father, 'I want my share of your estate now before you die.' So his father agreed to divide his wealth between his sons.

¹³ "A few days later this younger son packed all his belongings and moved to a distant land, and there he wasted all his money in wild living. ¹⁴ About the time his money ran out, a great famine swept over the land, and he began to starve. ¹⁵ He persuaded a local farmer to hire him, and the man sent him into his fields to feed the pigs.¹⁶ The young man became so hungry that even the pods he was feeding the pigs looked good to him. But no one gave him anything.

¹⁷ "When he finally came to his senses, he said to himself, 'At home even the hired servants have food enough to spare, and here I am dying of hunger! ¹⁸ I will go home to my father and say, "Father, I have sinned against both heaven and you, ¹⁹ and I am no longer worthy of being called your son. Please take me on as a hired servant.""

²⁰ "So he returned home to his father. And while he was still a long way off, his father saw him coming. Filled with love and compassion, he ran to his son, embraced him, and kissed him. ²¹ His son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against both heaven and you, and I am no longer worthy of being called your son.'

²² "But his father said to the servants, 'Quick! Bring the finest robe in the house and put it on him. Get a ring for his finger and sandals for his feet. ²³ And kill the calf we have been fattening. We must celebrate with a feast,²⁴ for this son of mine was dead and has now returned to life. He was lost, but now he is found.' So the party began.

²⁵ "Meanwhile, the older son was in the fields working. When he returned home, he heard music and dancing in the house, ²⁶ and he asked one of the servants what was going on. ²⁷ 'Your brother is back,' he was told, 'and your father has killed the fattened calf. We are celebrating because of his safe return.'

²⁸ "The older brother was angry and wouldn't go in. His father came out and begged him, ²⁹ but he replied, 'All these years I've slaved for you and never once refused to do a single thing you told me to. And in all that time you never gave me even one young goat for a feast with my friends. ³⁰ Yet when this son of yours comes back after squandering your money on prostitutes, you celebrate by killing the fattened calf!'

³¹ "His father said to him, 'Look, dear son, you have always stayed by me, and everything I have is yours.³² We had to celebrate this happy day. For your brother was dead and has come back to life! He was lost, but now he is found!'"

Jewish tradition accounts that children only receive their inheritance after their fathers died. In a sense, the younger son was saying, "You are dead to me, and I could care less about your reputation, your love, or your leadership. Notice that both sons had resentment towards the father for different reasons. Neither of them was thankful for what their father had already done for them.

This story reveals not only the heart of God, but also how the world got to be the way it is. God allows us to leave in hopes that we will come to our senses and come home. He will not force us to love and obey Him. We are relational beings just like Him, and relationship is a choice. Love cannot be forced, but is received and given freely. Sometimes the most loving thing God can do is allow us to leave and experience pain. Only then will we discover that every command He gives is motivated by His love for our good.

We're All Prodigal at some Point in Our Lives!

My oldest son, Christian, decided to reject my love and do his own thing, just like the son in the Bible story. He became a drug addicted young man who nearly lost his sanity for good. I could not protect him during that time because he would not let me. Every attempt I made to do so, he took as a threat to his freedom. Every rule I set was for his good, but he didn't see it that way. Finally, after several stays in jail and much to the distress of our family, we had to let him go.

He ended up in a homeless shelter with others that had damaged their minds, relationships, and lives as he had. Like the son in the story, it was there, in the homeless shelter, that he discovered love. His mom and I, as well as his brothers, grandparents, and others, loved him and wanted only what was best for him. While he was away, the pain in our hearts was indescribable. We dreaded that he would hurt himself or someone else while he was on drugs.

During that time, a friend of mine found out that my son was at a homeless shelter. Without asking, he went to where my son was, and took him to lunch. He spent time with him and told him how much his mother and I loved him. He sat there and prayed for my son. He sought after my son several times neither asking me nor informing me. When I later found out what this man had done, I was overwhelmed with gratefulness. The best thing this man could do for me was to care for my son and point him back home. This is the way the Lord feels when we pursue one of his lost children. When Christian did come back home, we threw a party and celebrated his return.

While I shared Christian's story with you, the truth is when I was young, I did the same thing to my parents. I destroyed my own life because of my hard heart and darkened understanding of the world. When my parents loved me and accepted me back, it changed my life. I discovered the heart of God towards me through my parents. However, my journey with my son revealed to me the heart of God towards His children. I understood how God feels towards His children that run from Him, and the lengths He will go to get them back. God's choice? To love you.

Here is the good news part, folks! God loves us so much that He is willing to allow us to go our own way. Then we discover the truth about our inability to live without God. By allowing us to have our own way, God is able to preserve free will, but most importantly, teach us that He is good and right. Ultimately, we learn that we are lost without Him.

What a wonderful story about God's love for people who have rebelled against Him. God desires that we come to our senses and come home of our own free will. If we will say, "I have had enough of my own way, and I want to come home," He immediately receives us and begins a relationship with us. This gives us peace in this life, but more than that, it also leads us to be with our Father forever.

In the Prodigal Son story, Jesus' point is that we are all in need of a Savior. We are all in need of healing. This is why Jesus came. He came to save us, heal us, and restore a personal relationship with the Father!

Remember this. Just because God allows us to go our own way does not mean that He isn't active in the world, nor does it mean He does not love us. He has a conclusion in mind for healing planet earth, and He is absolutely capable to do what He has in mind to do.

In Mark 8:27-30, Jesus has a discussion with His disciples. He asked, "Who do people say I am?" The disciples gave Him various answers like John the Baptist, Elijah, or one of the prophets. Then Jesus asked them an even more important question. "But who do you say I am?" Peter spoke up and said, "You are the Messiah."

Jesus was born in a little town called Bethlehem. He was born to Mary and Joseph, and He was the Son of God. God had come to Mary to tell her she would give birth to His Son, and she believed and was willing.

Jesus lived for 33 years on this earth. He lived the normal life of a carpenter, but was completely sinless. He performed miracles, and forgave sins. He amazed priests, and held children close. He was unlike any other man in history. He came to this earth knowing He would be sacrificed for sins He didn't commit. Yet, He loved the world so much, He came anyway.

Jesus is the Savior of the world!

week 2—the solution: who is Jesus?

Jesus made a very bold declaration in John 14:6; He stated, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me." Who is this Jesus, and what 'way, truth, and life' is He declaring? Without a doubt, Jesus is the most controversial figure in history. In today's world, the attack on "who" He is, and "what" He did, remains constant and aggressive. The volume of books on "who" Jesus is, and the theology (study of God) behind it, fills libraries. So for the sake of this study, we chose a small slice to hopefully motivate you to go beyond this workbook in your understanding of the greatness and awesomeness of Jesus Christ.

day 1: THE WAY: WHAT THE PROPHETS SAID

When I first gave my life to Christ, I would often hear Christians use the term "prophecy". I had a basic idea of what it meant, but not a very clear understanding. So, before we dive into the prophecies telling mankind that Jesus was coming, we must first answer an important question -What is prophecy?

The dictionary definition is as follows:

proph·e·cy

- n. pl. proph·e·cies
 - a. An inspired utterance of a prophet, viewed as a revelation of divine will.
 - **b.** A prediction of the future, made under divine inspiration.
 - c. Such an inspired message or prediction transmitted orally or in writing.
 - d. The vocation or condition of a prophet.

The Old Testament is filled with prophecies about what would happen in the future. The prophets heard from God, and then they spoke and wrote the message He gave them so that everyone would hear it.

1. Let's take a moment and look at a specific prophecy written by the prophet Isaiah. Read Isaiah 9:6-7 below.

For a child is born to us, a son is given to us. The government will rest on his shoulders. And he will be called: Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. ⁷ His government and its peace will never end.
He will rule with fairness and justice from the throne of his ancestor David for all eternity.
The passionate commitment of the Lord of Heaven's Armies will make this happen!

- Isaiah 9:6-7

"The way" simply means the direction to the goal. The prophets were foretelling that God will make a way back to Him. What Isaiah predicted came true in its entirety in Luke chapter 2. Because of this, we can trust that God will do what He said He would do. He is our Savior and Lord, and we can believe that whatever He says is true.

This may seem astounding, but none of the answers above are correct. As stated earlier, Luke, chapter 2 records the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy. The birth of Jesus in Luke 2 transpired approximately 700 years after Isaiah's prophesy.

The disciples believed because of fulfilled prophecy

One of the reasons the disciples believed that Jesus was the Messiah was because of the many prophecies in the Old Testament that they witnessed in the life of Jesus.

A Messiah-Savior is coming to save Israel and the world.

All right then, the Lord himself will give you the sign. Look! The virgin will conceive a child! She will give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel (which means 'God is with us')

- Isaiah 7:14

But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, are only a small village among all the people of Judah. Yet a ruler of Israel will come from you, one whose origins are from the distant past.

- Micah 5:2

A Messiah-Savior would suffer for the sins of the world.

He was oppressed and treated harshly, yet he never said a word.
He was led like a lamb to the slaughter. And as a sheep is silent before the shearers, he did not open his mouth.
⁸ Unjustly condemned, he was led away.
No one cared that he died without descendants, that his life was cut short in midstream.
But he was struck down for the rebellion of my people.

- Isaiah 53:7-8

What's even more astonishing about Scripture is that Jesus' death also occurred just as Isaiah prophesied above. Exact details of Jesus' life were foretold in the Old Testament, and <u>ALL</u> the prophesies of the Old Testament were completed 400 years before His birth! Let's look at some additional prophecies about the birth of Jesus.

Jesus' virgin birth was fulfilled in Matthew. Jesus crucifixion is detailed in Mark, and Revelation tells us that Jesus came from the tribe of Judah.

Just as we talked about earlier, God is faithful and His character never changes. He keeps His promises, and fulfills the prophecies of Scripture. Because of these qualities of God, we are able to trust what He says, and believe Him.

Only the *b* and *d* statements above are false. God is trustworthy. He will not let you down. So who is Jesus? The prophets predicted a Messiah would be the only way back to God, and God was powerful enough to make the prophecies of the Old Testament come true. He is powerful enough to keep all His promises. He is powerful enough to save you from your sins, and give you eternal life with Him. Hallelujah!

day 2: THE TRUTH: WHAT THE DISCIPLES SAW

In a court of law, they ask you to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth. A lawyer will begin to ask you to testify to what you have seen. They want to know what you have personally witnessed because only a witness can really tell the truth.

In the book of Acts, the disciples that followed Jesus testified a great deal about who He was based on what they had seen. The book of Acts is a historical account of the disciples of Jesus after He sent them out to go and make disciples in all the world. Jesus told them to wait in Jerusalem until the Holy Spirit would come to them, and then to preach and teach what they had seen and heard. Fifty days later, as they were praying, the Holy Spirit revealed Himself to them just as Jesus had said. After this, the disciples stepped out on the roof to address thousands of Jewish people who were celebrating a festival in Jerusalem.

Take a moment and read Peter's sermon in the book of Acts, chapter 2, verses 14 through 41 (Acts 2:14-41) and answer the questions that follow.

Then Peter stepped forward with the eleven other apostles and shouted to the crowd, "Listen carefully, all of you, fellow Jews and residents of Jerusalem! Make no mistake about this.¹⁵ These people are not drunk, as some of you are assuming. Nine o'clock in the morning is much too early for that.¹⁶ No, what you see was predicted long ago by the prophet Joel:

¹⁷ 'In the last days,' God says,

'I will pour out my Spirit upon all people.

- Your sons and daughters will prophesy. Your young men will see visions,
- and your old men will dream dreams. ¹⁸ In those days I will pour out my Spirit even on my servants—men and women alike and they will prophesy.
- ¹⁹ And I will cause wonders in the heavens above and signs on the earth below blood and fire and clouds of smoke.
- ²⁰ The sun will become dark, and the moon will turn blood red before that great and glorious day of the Lord arrives.
- ²¹ But everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.'

²² "People of Israel, listen! God publicly endorsed Jesus the Nazarene by doing powerful miracles, wonders, and signs through him, as you well know. ²³ But God knew what would happen, and his prearranged plan was carried out when Jesus was betrayed. With the help of lawless Gentiles, you nailed him to a cross and

killed him. ²⁴ But God released him from the horrors of death and raised him back to life, for death could not keep him in its grip.²⁵ King David said this about him:

'I see that the Lord is always with me. I will not be shaken, for he is right beside me.
²⁶ No wonder my heart is glad, and my tongue shouts his praises! My body rests in hope.

²⁷ For you will not leave my soul among the dead or allow your Holy One to rot in the grave.

²⁸ You have shown me the way of life, and you will fill me with the joy of your presence.'

²⁹ "Dear brothers, think about this! You can be sure that the patriarch David wasn't referring to himself, for he died and was buried, and his tomb is still here among us. ³⁰ But he was a prophet, and he knew God had promised with an oath that one of David's own descendants would sit on his throne. ³¹ David was looking into the future and speaking of the Messiah's resurrection. He was saying that God would not leave him among the dead or allow his body to rot in the grave.

³² "God raised Jesus from the dead, and we are all witnesses of this. ³³ Now he is exalted to the place of highest honor in heaven, at God's right hand. And the Father, as he had promised, gave him the Holy Spirit to pour out upon us, just as you see and hear today. ³⁴ For David himself never ascended into heaven, yet he said,

'The Lord said to my Lord,

"Sit in the place of honor at my right hand ³⁵ until I humble your enemies, making them a footstool under your feet.""

³⁶ "So let everyone in Israel know for certain that God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, to be both Lord and Messiah!"

³⁷ Peter's words pierced their hearts, and they said to him and to the other apostles, "Brothers, what should we do?"

³⁸ Peter replied, "Each of you must repent of your sins and turn to God, and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. Then you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. ³⁹ This promise is to you, and to your children, and even to the Gentile—all who have been called by the Lord our God." ⁴⁰ Then Peter continued preaching for a long time, strongly urging all his listeners, "Save yourselves from this crooked generation!"

⁴¹ Those who believed what Peter said were baptized and added to the church that day—about 3,000 in all.

Jesus is unique in history

The Bible shows that even the enemies of Christ saw Him perform miracles and could validate that He was different than any other human in history.

day 3: THE LIFE: WHAT JESUS GIVES

Try to imagine what it must have been like for those closest to Jesus, His disciples. When Jesus asked them to follow Him, they had jobs, families, even a place in the community they lived in. They left it all behind. They were often privately fighting about who the greatest of the disciples was, and what place of honor they would have in the coming Kingdom of Jesus. So you know they made it clear to everyone else that they were special.

Everything seemed to be going as planned when the city of Jerusalem opened its doors to them and people flooded out shouting hosanna to the King. The disciples gambled their entire lives on Jesus and His message, and it was paying off—or so they thought.

In the week before Jesus' death, everything seemed to spiral out of control. The hostility of the Jewish leaders intensified, and Jesus did nothing to stop it. In fact, He said things that seemed to stoke the fire. Added to that, Jesus told the disciples that He would be rejected by the leaders and killed. This did not fit into their theology concerning the Christ, so they chalked it up as a misunderstanding.

In the end, things happened just as Jesus said they would. On the night of Jesus death, the disciples were hiding from those who had killed their master.

They were confused and broken-hearted. What did this all mean? Perhaps they were even thinking, if they could kill Jesus, they surely would kill us as well. They had lost someone they all deeply loved. Can you put yourself into the mind of the disciples that night?

After Jesus' death, the disciples felt confused and hopeless. After Jesus' resurrection, the disciples began to understand. They recognized that Jesus' death for sin was only part of the plan. Their healing truly occurred after His resurrection.

Why are relationships so important to being a disciple?

"All I need is my relationship with God." Often Christians say this about their walks with God. Unfortunately, they are missing out on a significant part of being a healthy Christ follower. From the very beginning, God makes it clear He did not design us for relationship only with Him. After creating Adam, God looked at him and said that it was not good for man to be alone. But, Adam was not alone. He was with GOD!

God created us and knows what we need. He knows that in order for humans to be in healthy relationship with God, we also need each other. Sometimes the thought that we need others can be difficult for us to accept. Yet, to be a disciple, we must understand that we need others. In fact, the very foundation of the church is based on how we live together to bring glory to God and witness to the rest of the world.

So why do we need others? Relationships are the conduits that help us heal and grow as disciples. When we are in relationships with other believers, we can better understand how God works in our lives. When we are in sound Christian relationships, we can ask questions and be held accountable to biblical truth. We have people in our lives that see things we do not see. Countless times in our walks with Christ, we have seen God use others to help us process biblical truth or hold us accountable to truth. Without it, we only have our own filters for processing life in light of God's truth. We were not meant to do life alone!

When we look into the Bible, especially the book of Acts, we see that the early Christians did life together. They were not alone, and as a result, they grew spiritually and became a witness to the world. This is why we want you to be part of a small group. In a small group, you can know others and be known. It is here that you can ask questions and learn how God's Word applies to your life.

week 3—the commission: what is a disciple?

Everyone and everything has followers these days. We have Instagram and Twitter. We get friend requests on Facebook. We follow athletes, politicians, and movie stars. What does it mean to follow these things and these people? How much time do we devote to keep up with what's going on? Does any of this bring us into deep relationships with others, or is it mostly superficial? Now, we're not saying these things are bad! We are able to keep up with a lot of people using these tools! The kind of following that Jesus wants is totally different. His approach was from a much deeper relational perspective.

day 1: FOLLOWING: WALKING LIKE CHRIST

Jesus' perspective of a disciple is spelled out for us in Matthew 4:19. It says, "Jesus called out to them, 'Come, follow Me, and I will show you how to fish for people!" We get our definition of a disciple right out of this verse. A disciple is one who (a) knows and follows Christ, is (b) being changed by Christ, and (c) is committed to the mission of Christ.

If we are going to follow Christ, it's imperative that we began to deny the things that are not pleasing to God. The reason we deny ourselves, whether it is with possessions, time, destructive relationships, or anything else, is because we love God. He loved us first, and proved that by sending His Son to die on the cross. So in turn, we deny ourselves the things of our former lives because of what He did for us, and our desire is now to please God rather than ourselves.

We have free will.

To become a disciple we must make a choice to follow Christ. As mentioned in week 1, God gave you free choice or "free will." You are not made to be a robot. God has given you the capacity to choose. When Jesus went to the disciples, He simply stated, "come follow me...." The disciples could have said, "No, we are going to stay right here and fish."

Looking back in your life, you should be able to see how God specifically worked to draw you to Himself. Somewhere in that process, you had to choose to follow. The first choice was the ultimate choice of accepting the free gift of salvation. He continues to work in your life as you pursue Him, leaving you the choice to pursue His will over your own.

day 2: GROWING: MATURING IN CHRIST

As we grow in spiritual maturity, we can see markers, like traveling on a highway. We see many parallels to someone's physical growth in their spiritual growth. Unfortunately, many Christians can remain stuck in their growth. They become stagnant or resistant to some of the work God is doing in their lives that would cause growth. The disciples that Jesus walked with for over three years, went through stages of spiritual development. Scripture describes these stages, and compares them to the physical growth stages of life.

Our spiritual growth has nothing to do with our standing before God in Christ. In other words, God doesn't love you more, or like you better, if you're mature. Where you are in your spiritual growth doesn't change how God feels about you. He sees us in His Son as righteous and perfect.

In the statements above, both a and b are false. Statements c and d are true. Our righteousness cannot come from ourselves. It is God alone who makes us righteous. Our maturity in Christ does not change how God views us. Yet because of who He is, we should pursue a relationship with Him, and in that pursuit, we grow.

When we first become believers, we all are spiritual babies. Over time, and by pressing into your personal walk with Jesus, a new believer will grow in spiritual maturity. You must remember, your walk with Christ is a marathon, not a sprint. Never forget, Jesus loves us with a perfect love. He cannot love us more because we are more mature. In fact, God's Word says in Romans 5:8, *"God showed his great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners."*

If you checked all the above, you are well on your way to understanding that spiritual maturity has nothing to do with how long you have been a Christian or how long you have been in your church. Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 3, *"I couldn't talk to you as I would to spiritual people. I had to talk as though you belonged to this world or as though you were infants in the Christian life."* There are people who have been Christians for a very long time and are still very immature.

Spiritual growth is not related to acquiring biblical information, Scripture memorization, or biblical theology, unless that knowledge is applied and utilized so to conform your life to Christ. Knowledge does nothing but fill your mind with facts. To be honest, knowledge for the sake of knowledge can prove pretty dangerous. Why? Because the more biblical information you receive and don't apply, the more deceived you are about your true state of your maturity.

Spiritual maturity has to do with how much you grow in your understanding of God's grace - that is, His love for you and towards you. Works, or working in the church, is not a sign of maturity.

Scripture also uses the metaphor of parenting for the Christian discipleship process.

What is the goal of parenting? The goal of natural parenting is to raise children to be healthy, productive adults. This is similar in spiritual parenting. Read Hebrews 5:12-6:1a in your Bible.

Stages of Growth

Taken from the book, *Real-Life Discipleship* by Jim Putman, let's examine briefly the five different stages of Spiritual growth that we see in Scripture. These are simple concepts that aid you in identifying where you are in your spiritual development, where you need to go, and what you need to do get there.

Spiritually Dead: Those who have not accepted Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. They remain in rebellion against God and spiritually dead in their sin. This stage of the process is the front door to discipleship. The spiritually dead are characterized by their UNBELIEF towards God. Find and read Hebrews 3:14-19.

Spiritual Infant: Those who have accepted the Gospel and become born again spiritually. They often are connected to the message of salvation, but remain uninformed in the faith. They haven't had time for God to change much in their lives, but are excited about what God has done so far. Spiritual infants need close care by their spiritual parent, small group leader, and other, more mature believers.

Spiritual Child: Those who have accepted Christ and have made a basic connection with a spiritual family - the church. They are usually self-centered in their faith, and are very black and white in their thinking. Spiritual children are characterized with either being over-confident or under-confident in themselves.

Spiritual Young Adult: Those who are maturing in their faith, and are serving because God commands it, not just because it makes them feel good. They are very involved at church, and are good at putting God first, and others second. They don't think often of reproducing disciples, though. Their priorities have changed, and are continuing to do so.

Spiritual Parent: Those who understand what it means to be a reproducing disciple of Jesus Christ. They intentionally live their lives in close contact with God, and other people. They look for people to lead to Christ and disciple. They are able to feed themselves spiritually, and are living an intentional life. They are not perfect, and will readily admit to needing accountability and help from others. Spiritual parents know and take part in the mission of the church, and actively pursue these things.

In this study, we want to primarily focus on the first two stages of spiritual development. We view this much like a long distance journey. In order to successfully make your journey, you have to know the end destination, and what some of the key points are along the way. Although we will continue to mature in our faith until we reach Heaven, the stages of growth will help you navigate and understand what's needed at each point in your growth.

day 3: FOCUSING: FIXED ON CHRIST

Several years ago, a friend of mine decided to train to run marathons. His whole life he had a dream to run long difficult races, and someday possibly compete in the Ironman Triathlon. Once he began the arduous training, I watched as the priorities in his life began to change. He went from a fairly non-athletic lifestyle to a very focused and intentional life of healthy eating and strenuous training. His priorities drastically changed as he began to focus more and more on achieving his goals.

Unfortunately, many new Christians view the Christian life as a long list of "do's" and "don'ts." They have yet to discover that the Christian life is more of a journey than a list of tasks. Walking with Christ is a long journey that should be viewed more as a privilege than a chore. Building a life that is focused on growth is much like training for a marathon, and areas of your life may have to change to accomplish that goal. Later, in week 5, we will discuss the specifics of creating a life for growth. For now we want to help you simply evaluate where you are currently at as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Paul describes the path of a disciple as a place not only to run the race, but also to train for the race. Do what you do with purpose. That is, focus on achieving the goal. Run to win. Don't pretend to train and run the race. Actually live it out, and prove that you are serious. If what you say doesn't match up with what you do, then your testimony will have no influence.

Jesus was an extraordinarily focused individual. Because of it, the author of Hebrews challenges us to have the same focus. Hebrews 12:2 says, "We do this by keeping our eyes on Jesus, the champion who initiates and perfects our faith. Because of the joy awaiting him, he endured the cross, disregarding the shame. Now he is seated in the place of honor beside God's throne."

Processing life in relationships

In order to begin building the life of a disciple, you must realize your need for relationships. Relationships help us process Biblical truth. Healthy, Christian relationships can often help us see God's truth in a clearer way. To help you get focused, start by writing down your priorities as they are now. Look at each one, and ask God to help you put them in the right order.

Corrective Lenses

A friend of mine told me this story about his brother.

"I will never forget this life experience. My brother and I are nine years apart. From a very early age, his eyesight was poor. He could make out shapes, colors, etc., but had a very difficult time with the definition of those shapes and images. He lived the first three years of his childhood legally blind. Through several different experiences, my parents noticed that he was not responding well to certain things, his sight just didn't seem right. So, they made an appointment with an eye doctor. The doctor tested him for what seemed like hours - it's very difficult when a child is this young. What happened next almost brought me to tears, even as a 12-year old boy. The doctor put a set of corrective lenses on my little brother's eyes...his eyebrows raised as he sat in my mother's lap. He reached his little fingers up, touched her face and said, "oh..." He began to look all over the room with a grin that you couldn't wipe away. My mother was crying, and I was emotional. His life was changing right there in front of us. What he had never seen was coming into view, and the expression and emotion in the room was electric."

Proverbs 27:17 tells us that "As iron sharpens iron, so a friend sharpens a friend." In life, having relationships with Christ and with each other are the corrective lenses Jesus asks us to wear as we follow Him. These relationships enable us to see things we have never been able to see. They sharpen our focus on what's important. We process life best when we see through these lenses. Our relationships give us a more focused picture of how God is using our circumstances to help grow us up and mature us as disciples of Christ.

After all that God created that was good, when it came to man He clearly states (for our purpose, not His), "It is NOT good for man to be alone." The truth is that God hard-wired us for relationship, not only with Him, but also with each other.

It is very clear in Scripture that two are better than one. As you can see, God has hardwired us for relationships. Relationships are the corrective lenses that we can wear enabling us to see clearly. Relationships provide things like accountability, support, and love.

Processing life with others is a key to your maturity in Christ. It enables you to see your circumstances from several perspectives. It gives you a place to air your concerns, process frustrations, and to share your struggles.

This is very different from what the world tells us about relationship. Our world tells us to keep our struggles hidden, not to bother anyone with our issues. They are signs of weakness. Our world tells us to process life in secret, because it is safer there. The truth, however, is that God created us to live in relationship with each other. When we process life alone, we can often develop wrong priorities, wrong conclusions, and a wrong focus.

When you commit your life to being a disciple of Jesus Christ, you are really committing to doing life in relationship with Jesus and with others. This is the way that Jesus taught us to process life. Relationships are God designed. In good times, it is always more fulfilling to celebrate with those closest to you, with those whom you have deep relationships. In the same way, when you are struggling, it is more helpful to have someone with whom to process certain thoughts and feelings.

Even when we are wrong, relationship is how we gain right perspective. Relationships are our corrective lenses. God has designed us to process all situations in life through the lenses of relationships - with God, and with each other.

What is the difference between Small Group and Bible study?

Because you are new to the church, you will eventually begin to hear terms like Sunday School, Small Group, Cell Group, Bible Study, Life Group, etc. These are all terms that have jockeyed for position in numerous churches throughout time and history. Rather than define terms, let's look at the similarities and differences between the two strongest areas, Bible Studies and Small Groups:

As you can see, there are some similarities. For example, both use God's Word intentionally, but for different purposes. The key is not to get hung up on terms, but to simply understand that the two work very well together. Bible Studies/Sunday Schools are intended to help with our biblical knowledge. Small Groups give us a more personable environment to mature completely in our relationships with each other. As you can see, both Bible Studies and Small Groups work hand in hand in your growth as a mature disciple.

week 4—the challenge: how do i follow Christ?

From a young age, we humans struggle for independence and autonomy. We long to be free from the authority of others and make up our own minds about what to wear, what to eat, how late we will stay up and what pleasures we will pursue. Becoming a Christ follower changes us. Suddenly, our plans no longer look all that appealing. By coming under the authority of Jesus, we are free to be saved by Him, to be used by Him for a greater purpose, and to share His love with others.

day 1: SURRENDERING MY HEART

We will look at the answers for b and c in days two and three. Today we will focus on what God requires first. Did you notice that the first thing God asks you to surrender in this passage is your heart? The heart is so important to God. In fact:

- Romans 10:9 lets us know that even salvation is dependent on the heart.
- Psalm 86:12 and 111:1 shows that God wants us to thank Him from the heart, not the head.
- 1 Peter 3:15 explains that Jesus is not residing in our heads, but our hearts.

Matthew 22:36-39 is not a new declaration. God has always desired the heart of man. In the passage from Matthew, Jesus is actually quoting a very well-known Old Testament passage to the Jewish people. Read the passage from Deuteronomy 6:4-5:

"Listen, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone.⁵ And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your strength.

The Jewish people then, as well as today, refer to this verse as the *Shema*. *Shema* means to love the Lord with all that you are. This Scripture is very sacred to the Jewish people. It is the central prayer in Jewish culture and is often the first Scripture that a Jewish child learns. In Matthew 22:36-37, Jesus recites the *Shema* and tells the audience it is the "greatest commandment."

It is difficult to love someone we don't know, so knowing Christ should be our first priority. Jesus expounds on the *Shema* passage by telling us to love others as well. He links these two commands into one and makes our horizontal love of others evidence of our vertical love for God.

Let's look at what it means to really love God with all our hearts. The story is told in Luke 10:25-37. One day, a religious leader stood up to ask Jesus a question. The man asked Jesus what he needed to do to inherit eternal life. Jesus asked him, "What does the law of Moses say about this?" The man answered, "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your strength, and all your mind. And Love your neighbor as yourself." Jesus agreed that the man should do these things. Then the man asked, "Who is my neighbor?"

There was a Jewish man travelling from Jerusalem to Jericho. On his way, robbers attacked him. They beat him, took his clothes, and left him for dead on the side of the road.

A priest was walking down the road and came upon the injured man. When he saw the man, he crossed over to the other side, and passed by without offering to help.

Next, an assistant at the Temple came by. He stopped, looked at the man lying there, and then he too passed by on the other side of the road.

A third man came travelling down this same road. He was a Samaritan, and the Jews despised the Samaritans. When this third man saw the beaten man, he had compassion. He lifted the Jewish man on his donkey, and took him to an inn. He washed and bandaged the wounded man, and paid for the innkeeper to continue his care.

So, like Jesus asked, "Who was the neighbor of this man attacked by these robbers?" The religious leader replied that it was the one who showed mercy. Jesus told him to go and do the same.

Are you beginning to see the connection between "surrendering" and "loving"? The priest represents someone in a prestigious position, whereas the Levite represents someone really religious. Jesus showed us in this story that love is not about titles or positions; real love is a willingness to serve from the heart.

6. What does this story tell you about having a religion versus having a relationship with Jesus Christ?

7. In Romans 5:6-8, what did God surrender for you?

What are some things you can surrender that are hindering you from giving your whole heart to Jesus? Jesus wanted those who were listening to learn a very important lesson. No matter how important you think you are, you're still on the same page with everyone else in God's eyes. God shows no favoritism to His children. Jesus demonstrated in this story that even if someone's different than you or comes from "the wrong side of the tracks," God expects His children to have compassion for others.

As you surrender aspects of your heart to Jesus, He will begin to fill that empty area with a compassion for others. That is, the more you genuinely love and serve God, the more you genuinely desire to serve others. Compassion becomes a natural response to those who have been robbed of their joy, peace, and happiness.

day 2: SURRENDERING MY LIFE

After surrendering our hearts in Matthew 22:36-39, Jesus then asks us to surrender our souls. For the sake of simplicity, the heart is where your passions lie, but the soul is who you are.

In our culture today, we are told that we should have the freedom to be who we want to be and to do as we please. Becoming a follower of Christ changes all this. God asks us to give up things that have taken over our lives and our identities. By coming under the authority of Jesus, we are challenged to free our lives from sin.

A key building block for understanding why we follow Jesus is to understand "salvation." Luke 19:10 states Jesus came to *"seek and to saved that which is lost."* A key question here is, "Saved from what?" Understanding this will help you to know what aspects of your life you have to surrender.

Our separation from God is due to our sin. When there is sin in our lives, it becomes how we are identified. Even though Jesus has paid for it spiritually, naturally we must still give it up. While our sin no longer exists in the spiritual world, God does not want it to exist in the real world either. When we accept Jesus as our Lord, the habit of sin still exists, and it can hinder us from following Him.

Jesus has paid the price for our sin. When we understand who Jesus is, and what He has done for us, we not only want to surrender our hearts to him (salvation), but also our souls (sanctification) to Him as well. If you surrendered your heart to Him, He is your Savior; when you surrender your soul to Him, He is your Lord.

Baptism

When we understand how amazing it is that the God of the universe saved us, our next step in following Jesus should be baptism. God has saved us from our sin, our death, and in many cases, ourselves. Because of this, one of our first responses should be a public demonstration of our surrendering through baptism.

The first public act of Jesus' ministry was baptism. Likewise, one of the first acts of surrendering our lives is to be baptized.

Read the story of the Ethiopian's baptism in Acts 8:26-40.

6. What does this passage teach us about baptism?

7. What was the reaction of the Ethiopian servant once he understood the passage of Scripture?

This story teaches us that Baptism should be an immediate reaction to the Gospel. If you have not been baptized, talk with your mentor. When we look at the Ethiopian, we see his reaction was immediate, and he even insisted on being baptized in the water that was close by.

Baptism symbolizes a willingness to surrender sin and a sinful life. It is a public declaration that our sins have been washed away and our future begins anew. We see in Scripture that those who have believed the message of the gospel, repented, and confessed Christ as Lord and Savior. Then they were baptized as a public act of following Jesus.

day 3: SURRENDERING MY MIND

My first reason for not accepting Christ had been intellectual ones, so my father sent me a book written by Josh McDowell-Evidence That Demands a Verdict. It challenged me to think. My father sent me books to answer my questions about evolution. At first I was skeptical about what they said, but as I questioned my professors, they had no answers to the challenges these books made. Slowly but surely, I came to believe that Christianity was based in truth."

As we follow Christ, we will likely begin to see the world in a new way. When we first come to Christ, there are things we believe that aren't consistent with the Word of God. God wants us to love Him with our hearts (what we desire), with our souls (how we live), and our minds (how we think). An area that helps, and sometimes hurts, our relationships with Christ is our thinking.

As mentioned earlier, the word "surrender" is defined as: *to yield, give up, give over, submit, abandon, relinquish, cede, waive, or give in to.* The Bible tells us that our minds need to be transformed or renewed. In order to do that, Christ has to become our authority. We must accept new things, and surrender old things.

Romans 12:1-2 says:

And so, dear brothers and sisters, I plead with you to give your bodies to God because of all he has done for you. Let them be a living and holy sacrifice—the kind he will find acceptable. This is truly the way to worship him.² Don't copy the behavior and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect.

The old singer *Meatloaf* had a secular song that reached number 11 on Billboard top 100. The song was called "*Two Out of Three Ain't Bad.*" While we are not endorsing the song or artist, the message of getting "some" is better than getting "none" only holds true in the secular world. When you surrender to God, He wants three out of three. He wants you to surrender your heart, soul, and mind so that your transformation is fully complete in Him.

Chaos, by definition, is the absence of peace or harmony and it's something God does not want you, His child, to be tormented with. What do we mean? Great question! Have you ever wanted to do something in your heart, but your head kept thinking differently? Or you were thinking about doing something good with your body (i.e., eat healthy), but your heart wasn't in it? This chaos is an inner turmoil that Paul vividly describes in Romans 7:18-25:

And I know that nothing good lives in me, that is, in my sinful nature. I want to do what is right, but I can't.¹⁹ I want to do what is good, but I don't. I don't want to do what is wrong, but I do it anyway.²⁰ But if I do what I don't want to do, I am not really the one doing wrong; it is sin living in me that does it.

²¹ I have discovered this principle of life—that when I want to do what is right, I inevitably do what is wrong. ²² I love God's law with all my heart. ²³ But there is another power within me that is at war with my mind. This power makes me a slave to the sin that is still within me. ²⁴ Oh, what a miserable person I am! Who will free me from this life that is dominated by sin and death? ²⁵ Thank God! The answer is in Jesus Christ our Lord. So you see how it is: In my mind I really want to obey God's law, but because of my sinful nature I am a slave to sin.

Notice in verse 23, Paul describes the inner war that resides in his mind. However, he finds deliverance in verse 25 by surrendering to Christ. Becoming a Christian and allowing God to lead you means that you have surrendered <u>ALL</u> to Him.

Take a moment to look up and read Romans 6:16-19. In that passage, you see that you were once a slave to sin but now you are free. You are no longer a slave to sin. Or in other words, sin is no longer your master. Jesus is your master, and as you follow Him, He will transform you.

Sometimes we just do not have the answers for a given situation, but God does. Know that God can use you if you are willing to let him use you. Sometimes it might be saying a word of encouragement, other times it might be to just pray. Often we have to trust Jesus in the midst of our own insecurity. We must remember that we are yielded to Christ and that we must trust him in the midst of a difficult situation.

Hopefully you wrote about surrendering or yielding to Christ in your life. Maybe you also wrote about God using you to help or talk to others in a difficult time. God wants to mature you as a disciple so that in turn, you can turn around and help someone else. To do that, you must surrender your heart, mind, and soul to Him as both Savior and Lord.

To renew your mind you must spend time learning about biblical truth. You take out the old ways of thinking and believing, and replace them with the truths of the Bible. In week five, you will learn how to have a healthy devotional time, learning how to spend time with God. This will also help you train yourself to be reading the Bible, and asking questions about what you don't understand.

What does the Bible say about Heaven and Hell?

Heaven is an actual place where God lives and where believers will go to live for eternity. Jesus describes it as His Father's home which he is going to prepare for us in John 14:1-3. He goes on to say that He will come back to take believers there with Him.

Heaven is beautiful. In Revelation 21, John is given a vision of heaven, and he describes it by comparing it to the most beautiful and valuable objects on earth – gates like pearls, walls crafted of precious gemstone and streets of gold. Because we know that this world is a dim reflection of heaven's glory, we can safely say that heaven will be more wonderful than our minds can imagine.

In heaven we will have real, physical bodies like Christ did following His resurrection. We will eat and drink and recognize one another. Our bodies will be transformed and will not be bound by the limitations and decay that our earthly bodies experience. There is no death, no crying, no mourning and no pain.

The most important, most attractive thing about heaven is the restored relationship of man and God. God created us for relationship with Him and with each other. That relationship was broken in the Garden of Eden by sin, but will be restored in heaven for those who have made a commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord of their lives. Heaven is where believers live after death, in the physical presence of God forever.

Hell is an actual place where those who reject Jesus will go to live for eternity. Jesus talks about bodies being thrown into hell forever in Matthew, Mark and Luke.

Hell is described in the Bible as a place of darkness, a lake of fire and sulfur that burns day and night forever, a pit and a place of unending torment.

Hell is popularly characterized as a raucous, never ending party filled with sinners living it up in scandalous red costumes, hosted by king Satan. The reality of hell is that it is a place of isolation and complete separation from God and others, and there is no escape. Hell is the punishment that God prepared for Satan and his disobedient angels. Satan will not be reigning over hell. He is the chief prisoner.

Hell is a place with no relationships, the opposite of everything God created us for. Hell is where non-believers live after death, completely separated from God forever with no chance of reconciliation. Unfortunately, hell is where those that reject Jesus, as God's only Son, will reside.

week 5— the transformation: how does Christ change me?

Being in a relationship changes us. When we follow the lives of Jesus' disciples in the New Testament, we see great change in them. For example, Peter has a very different view of Jesus from his first interaction with Him compared to his view when preaching the first sermon in Acts 2. The time they spent in relationship, and the experiences he had with Jesus changed him forever.

When we are in relationship with God and others, Christ changes us. We learn new things about ourselves, and the ones with whom we have a relationship. We gain new perspective, and often have the rough edges knocked off. That's part of why God designed us to be in relationship with one another. When we are in a close relationship with God, the same things happen.

day 1: SPENDING TIME WITH GOD

Remember what it was like when you had your first true, best friend? For many of us, that happened when we were children. We wanted to be with our friend all the time. We wanted to have our friend over to play, and we wanted to go spend time at their house also. We liked the same things. Maybe we were in the same class, went to the same church, or just lived down the same street.

For some of us who are older, we say our best friend is our spouse. When we first met, we wanted to spend every waking moment together, learning all we could about the other. Over time, the relationship deepened into love, and we were married. Over the years, though, our marriages can go two ways. We can get closer, and keep the relationship fresh, or we drift apart and feel like we don't know one another anymore.

Our relationship with Christ, however, is unlike anything we have experienced here on earth. When we first accept Christ, we are overwhelmed by His mercy and grace and love. We tell everyone we know about what Jesus has done for us. How do we keep our relationship with Christ growing deeper and stronger?

1. Read John 15:1-5 in your Bible.

What does this chapter say we must do to stay close to Jesus?

2. What do you think it would require to "remain" in Jesus?

You should have answered question 1 by talking about remaining in Jesus. As we read the Bible, and spend time in prayer, we are able to have a closer, deeper relationship with Christ. This not only affects our relationship with Christ, but also, as we remain in Christ, we begin to bear fruit. Bearing fruit means that we are living a life pleasing to God, and that we are impacting the people around us. We are sharing our faith, and growing in our relationship with Jesus. This is God's desire for all who trust in Him.

So, what's next? Let's start by learning how to have a quiet time. The time we spend with the Lord should be in a place where we can concentrate, and be able to hear when God speaks. There are thousands of devotional books out there to give you a start. The main thing is reading the Word of God.

Here's an example:

Read John 3:16-18 and ask questions about the passage:

- What does this teach me about God?
- What do these verses teach me about the Christian life?
- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a change in my life that needs to be made?

Your personal notes may look something like this:

John 3:16-18

* God loves us <u>SO MUCH</u> he sent his son to SAVE us

* As a believer, there is no judgment against me

* His command is ~ BELIEVE IN JESUS!

* I do believe, so no change is required of me from this passage. However - I should share this message with my friends and family!!!

After you've read the verses, and answered the questions, then spend some time praying. You can ask your mentor for some devotional guides that will help you.

What is prayer?

Prayer is nothing more than talking to God. Remember when we talked about our best friends? How easy was it to share all our thoughts, dreams, and secrets with that person? Jesus is now your truest, closest friend. You can tell Him anything, and He will still love you. You can be excited about something, and He will rejoice with you! You can be sad or angry, and He will hear your every plea.

There are a lot of "plans" out there on how to pray, what to pray, and so on. The truth is that there is no magic formula for how to pray. Just open your heart, and let whatever is in there come out. So, praise the Lord for His goodness. Confess your sins to the Lord, and receive forgiveness. Tell God your needs and your desires. Thank Him for hearing your prayers and for what He has already done in your life! God knows it all anyway, but praying about it gives us freedom. Talk to Him like He is your best friend. He truly does love you best, and love you most.

What do these verses teach us about prayer?

The verses above are by no means all that the Bible teaches us about prayer, but they do give us a good start in understanding the power and importance of prayer in our lives. Your answers to the questions should have included that anyone can pray at anytime, anyplace, and about anything! There are some specifics, but we wanted to show you in these verses how diverse prayer is, and that it is for our benefit. We get to come into the presence of the Holy God, and pour out our hearts to Him. What a blessing!

God wants to communicate with us. The best way to accomplish that is through Bible reading and prayer. God is rejoicing over you right now as you go through this workbook. It shows that you are serious in your newfound journey with Him.

day 2: LEARNING FROM THE HOLY SPIRIT

In day one, you looked at how God changes you through your communication with Him. Communication with God comes through His Word and prayer. Today we want to look at how the Holy Spirit changes us, and how God can use His people to change us as well. God gave us the Holy Spirit, the Word, and the people of God to help shape us into the image of Christ. These same three gifts also play a huge part in how God works to direct us into His will.

Who is the Holy Spirit?

Before we look at how He works and changes us, we need to understand WHO He is. The Holy Spirit is often referred to as the Advocate or the Helper in other translations. He is fully God, and part of the Trinity. The Holy Spirit is God. He possesses a will, intellect and emotions. He is God with all His own attributes of deity. He is the third person of the Trinity, and co-equal with God the Father and God the Son. There is only one God, but He manifests Himself in three persons, whom we call the Trinity.

So why did He come to earth? The Bible says The Holy Spirit came to glorify Christ and to lead followers of Christ into all truth. Jesus told His disciples in the Upper Room, "But when the Father sends the Advocate as my representative – that is, the Holy Spirit – he will teach you everything and will remind you of everything I have told you." The Holy Spirit came to enable you to know Christ through a new life and understanding. You will see that The Holy Spirit will make the Word of God relevant and meaningful when you most need it.

In your summary above, you should have included several things. First, the Holy Spirit is your Advocate. He is on your side. Secondly, He leads you into all truth. You can trust Him. Lastly, He has come to make you holy. The Holy Spirit sets you apart as a child of God, and no one can take Him away from you.

How does the Holy Spirit Change me?

Let's start today by reading some important Scriptures about how the Holy Spirit works in the lives of believers.

Next, notice that God gives us godly people to advise us as we search out God's will for our lives. Together, The Word of God and The Holy Spirit begin changing us to be more and more like Christ.

Unfortunately for us, as humans, we can ignore this work that God wants to do in us. We still have a sinful nature within us that creates a battle. We sometimes fight with God's truth, and want our own way. This is much like a young child with a parent. The parents tell the child to do something that they know is best for the child, but the child wants what he thinks is best.

4. Read Romans 8:5-11. Describe the differences between the sinful nature and the spiritual nature.

The verses in Romans 8 tell us that living according to the sinful nature leads to death. The sinful nature is always hostile to God. It cannot please God in any way.

If you are a follower of Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit dwells in you. The Holy Spirit controls your spiritual nature. When the Spirit controls you, you receive life and peace!

Besides the Holy Spirit, God uses other Christians to change us as well. As Christians, we are all called to use our abilities and biblical truth to help each other grow. Those who God has placed in your life (your mentor, small group leader, parent or friend) can be used by God to help shape you into who God wants you to be. You too will use your God-given abilities to help others and see that you are called to help and serve them.

Putting it all together

As we approach the Word, we ask God to speak through it by the power of His Holy Spirit. When we understand God's will in His Word, the Bible, we know what kinds of things about which to ask direction. Obviously, it does no good to ask God to do something that contradicts what He has already said He will or will not do. As we seek to know His Word, and the Holy Spirit interacts with us, we also are sharing our thoughts, discoveries, and decisions with other believers so that we can get wise counsel. If we are new believers, it is very important that we have mature disciples help us understand the meanings of Scripture. When we come to a conclusion about what we think God wants, we then begin to ask God through prayer to give us strength to do what He has told us to do. We also ask Him to open doors and show us that they are open so we can move forward. Remember that God's Word and God's Spirit never contradict. It was God's Spirit that wrote God's Word through the prophets and disciples of Jesus. Test the advice others give you by the Word, and of course, keep praying. As you begin to pray, watch to see what God does next in answer to your prayer. Sometimes God says yes, sometimes He says no, and sometimes He says wait.

When we hear a person telling a story, we often gauge its validity based on how close he was to the actual event. A story told by a person that was not present when it happened can lessen how much credibility is given to the story. We can also sometimes "doubt" the testimony of a person we know has questionable character. The opposite is also true. When we know a person is telling the story of an event they watched, or if we know the person has trustworthy character, we give more credibility to the event. The testimony becomes more "credible".

Every Christian has a testimony. Even if you have only been a follower of Christ for one day, you have a testimony. Often the greatest way to impact those around you is to share what God has done in your life. The credibility of God's work in your life is both witnessed and heard by the testimony of your life. This becomes one of the most powerful ways to share what God has done. This week you will work on writing and sharing your testimony.

Look up and read the story in John 9 about Jesus healing a blind man. Then answer the questions listed below.

- 1. What happened to the blind man physically from his interaction with Jesus?
- 2. What happened to the blind man spiritually from his interaction with Jesus?
- 3. What was the impact on the individuals that witnessed the event?
- 4. As a response to the healing, what did the blind man do?

In questions 1 and 2, you should have written that the blind man was healed. Jesus healed him physically and spiritually. From that miracle, we see that the man had a testimony. In question 3, you should have answered that the impact was dramatic on people nearby, and they were able to see the power that Jesus had. This healing gave

the blind man a testimony that he could share with the world. He responded by telling those that opposed or questioned about the power of Jesus.

God is always at work in the world around us. The work that God has done in your life becomes a story much like the blind man. You may or may not have had a physical illness, but your story can have dramatic impact on those around you. Your story can teach others about God's love, amazing grace, salvation, and how He can work in the lives of those that give their lives to Him.

just so you know...

What is a tithe?

No topic in the church has created more controversy than financial giving. For you, as a new believer, we want to help you begin your walk with Christ with a healthy view of the biblical concept of "tithe".

So what is a tithe? Tithe simply means "a tenth". This was the biblical standard that God asked his people to give back to Him. God asked the people to bring a tithe back into the storehouses so that the work of God could continue. An issue often arises whenever people lose sight of the original intent of this concept. We begin caring more about our own money and materials than the One who gave it to us. So, you see, all that you have is God's. He gave it all to you. What God asks of us is to trust Him to continue to provide and to be generous with what He as already given.

Does God really need our money? No, He does not need our money. God owns everything. Even the paper that this workbook is written on belongs to God. God asks us to tithe because He knows that whatever we treasure is what we put our hearts into. God cares so much about us that He does not want money to become our god. God wants us to treasure Him. To give Him our hearts and to have Him as Lord of our lives is way more valuable than money or any material possession.

If we understand what Jesus has done for us, then wouldn't we want to surrender it all? Jesus asks us to be a people of generosity.

week 6—the commitment: what is my part in the mission of Christ?

The first people Jesus recruited to join Him on His mission were the 12 disciples. They were a very diverse group of men from many different backgrounds, with many different occupations, perspectives and skills. Jesus did not choose them randomly. He had a place and a plan for each of the twelve. To effectively carry out the mission, He needed a man of action, like Peter, a man who was organized and precise, like Phillip, and even a man like Matthew, who was a former tax collector for the Roman government. Likewise, we are all part of Jesus' mission for a purpose. Each of us has gifts and talents, skills and perspectives that make us unique and valuable team members.

day 1: UNDERSTANDING THE CHURCH

Have you ever observed a high functioning team? Maybe it was a sports team or a mechanical team working together, each playing their part working toward an end goal. In many aspects of life, we can see teams of people working together, and when they are good at what they do, it is fun to watch.

The church is a type of team. Well, it is supposed to be anyway. People, who have decided to follow Jesus, all coming together to accomplish God's plan. There are business personnel, lawyers, landscaping professionals, financial planners, mothers, fathers and so many more. Think about it this way. The church isn't a building. It is not a place where we all assemble, sing songs, say prayers, and listen to some guy teach from the Bible. The church is a team of people, assembled for a very unique purpose - to make disciples who make disciples of Jesus Christ.

Read Matthew 16:13-18 below.

When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?"

¹⁴ "Well," they replied, "some say John the Baptist, some say Elijah, and others say Jeremiah or one of the other prophets."

¹⁵ Then he asked them, "But who do you say I am?"

¹⁶ Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

¹⁷ Jesus replied, "You are blessed, Simon son of John because my Father in heaven has revealed this to you. You did not learn this from any human being. ¹⁸ Now I say to you that you are Peter (which means 'rock'), and upon this rock I will build my church, and all the powers of hell will not conquer it.

Peter's confession that Jesus was indeed the Son of God is the defining moment for the church. Jesus builds His church on Peter's statement, and says that the all the powers of hell will not conquer it. Do you see how limited the influence of Jesus' church would be if we defined it as a building? Now, buildings are great tools we can use to gather together for worship or fellowship, but there is no power in our facilities, no power in our church's programs, no power even in our Sunday services. The power we have as a church is our personal and corporate declaration that Jesus is who He says He is.

The actual definition for the church comes from the Greek word, "Ecclesia", meaning, "the called out ones." The church, built on Peter's declaration that Jesus IS the Son of God, is a team of people with various personalities and gifts, sent out to make disciples of all nations.

3. Read Acts 2:42-47. List the things the people in the early church did together or for one another.

The early church had the right idea about relationship. They met together on a regular basis, sometimes in one place, and other times, in various homes. They prayed together, and committed themselves to learning all they could from the apostles' teachings about Jesus. They helped meet the needs of those around them. They ate together, worshiped together, and shared what they had, all because of what the Lord had done for them.

Go and Make Disciples...

Regardless of our specific gifting within the church, all of us, as followers of Christ, are commanded to make disciples. This is not a job just for paid pastors; this is the responsibility of ALL believers. As we read in the Matthew 16 passage, the powers of hell will not prevail against Jesus' church. In the process of making disciples, when we participate, we are storming the gates of hell. Once you became a Christian, Jesus calls you to go into the world and make disciples.

So what about you? Use the following list below to help you think about people that need Christ.

- Someone that lives in your home.
- Someone at work or school.
- Someone that lives in your neighborhood or community.
- A friend or family member.

Spend time praying for these people. God can lead these people to you, and as you interact with them, you can share with them about who Jesus is.

Here is an example of what we are talking about. One day while helping my (Brandon) children with homework, I received a phone call. On the other end of the phone was an old friend of mine that I had been praying for more than 3 years to come to know Christ. He was very upset and crying on the phone. He began to explain to me that his family was falling apart and that he had nowhere to turn. This allowed me to finally, after three years, share the gospel, and he was broken enough to submit his life to Christ. From that point, I was able to begin discipling him in his walk with Christ. God worked in a difficult situation and in the heart of my friend, and through a difficult time, God drew him to Himself.

day 2: USING MY GIFTS

God wants us to have a personal relationship with Him, and as we do, He starts to produce spiritual fruit in our character. We are becoming like Him –more loving, kind, forgiving, etc., but we are also producing fruit in the sense that we are using our experiences, and abilities to point people to our loving God.

Our goal is to walk with Jesus so that He can shape us. He prunes off all the branches that bear no fruit. He also fills us with His knowledge and understanding of what He wants us to do with our lives, and gives us the power to do it. The first priority in every believer's life is found in the Scripture below. Let's see if you can find it.

"I am the true grapevine, and my Father is the gardener.² He cuts off every branch of mine that doesn't produce fruit, and he prunes the branches that do bear fruit so they will produce even more.³ You have already been pruned and purified by the message I have given you.⁴ Remain in me, and I will remain in you. For a branch cannot produce fruit if it is severed from the vine, and you cannot be fruitful unless you remain in me.

⁵ "Yes, I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who remain in me, and I in them, will produce much fruit. For apart from me you can do nothing.

- John 15:1–5

1. What do you think is the priority?

God wants us to bear fruit. What does this mean? Here are some examples God uses to help us bear fruit in our lives.

God's overall will for us is to be used in His mission to save the world.

This means that anyone who belongs to Christ has become a new person. The old life is gone; a new life has begun!

¹⁸ And all of this is a gift from God, who brought us back to himself through Christ. And God has given us this task of reconciling people to him. ¹⁹ For God was in Christ, reconciling the world to himself, no longer counting people's sins against them. And he gave us this wonderful message of reconciliation. ²⁰ So we are Christ's ambassadors; God is making his appeal through us. We speak for Christ when we plead, "Come back to God!"

- 2 Corinthians 5:17-20

God has a place for us on His team.

All of you together are Christ's body, and each of you is a part of it.

- 1 Corinthians 12:27

Their responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church, the body of Christ.¹³ This will continue until we all come to such unity in our faith and knowledge of God's Son that we will be mature in the Lord, measuring up to the full and complete standard of Christ.

¹⁴ Then we will no longer be immature like children. We won't be tossed and blown about by every wind of new teaching. We will not be influenced when people try to trick us with lies so clever they sound like the truth.

- *Ephesians* 4:12–14

The body of Christ is built up when we allow ourselves to be equipped. We are all a part of the body, and must play our part if God is to be glorified, We are to grow into maturity. Notice that God placed leaders in the church who will help you discover your gifts and abilities to contribute to the body of Christ. Then, they will help equip you to do the job God gave you to do.

God wants us to be available to be set apart for His work.

In a wealthy home some utensils are made of gold and silver, and some are made of wood and clay. The expensive utensils are used for special occasions, and the cheap ones are for everyday use. ²¹ If you keep yourself pure, you will be a special utensil for honorable use. Your life will be clean, and you will be ready for the Master to use you for every good work.

- 2 Timothy 2:20–21

When Jesus saves us, He sets us apart. If we desire to be used for important things, then all we need do is make ourselves available for His purposes. We don't have to be amazing to be used by God. We just need to be available to use whatever gifts He has given us for His glory. It is an amazing thing to watch God work when we say yes to Him. Our pains, scars, and gifts, no matter how insignificant they may seem to us or to the world, can be used in mighty ways.

There are several Scriptures that tell us about the gifts God gives to those who trust Him. God gives these gifts to us for many reasons. First of all, He gives them to us so that we produce spiritual fruit. We bear spiritual fruit in several ways. Growing personally in our faith, telling someone about Jesus, and showing God's character in our lives are examples.

Secondly, God gives us gifts to glorify Him. He wants us to live like Jesus more and more each day. When our actions, speech, and thoughts are Christ-like, we bring glory to God. Also, when we use our gifts in a way that pleases Him, we receive God's blessings.

Lastly, God gives us gifts to build others up. The Bible tells us that we are all part of the same body. If one person doesn't do his or her job, then the whole body suffers. When we do the things God has designed for us to do, the church is healthy and will grow. If only a few people are doing all the work of the church, then the whole body will get tired, and sick. That's why we must identify what gifts God has given us, and use them for our good and His glory.

day 3: FACING THE ENEMY

When a soldier goes off to war, there are things he must do to prepare. He gets the training he needs. He learns about the enemy and its weaknesses. He stocks his pack with the necessary items for battle. He studies the terrain, and plans strategy. And the list goes on.

So it also goes with the Christian life. You are in a battle. Satan does not want you to succeed in your relationship with Jesus Christ. He will attack any and all efforts to be an effective soldier in the war. If that doesn't work, he wants to make you doubt that you really are a disciple, or that God really did save you through your faith in Jesus Christ. He will tell you any lie he can to cause you to doubt.

Another one of the devil's tricks is to tempt you to commit some great sin to ruin your testimony. The devil entices you to give in to your sinful nature. When you do this, the devil then loves to accuse you of failing. He tells you that you are useless in helping others follow Christ, rendering you ineffective in God's army. The Bible calls our struggle a fight against an enemy that we can't even see. Temptation is something believers will have to deal with for the rest of our lives here on earth.

God's Word is very clear about the struggle we face on this planet. We become disappointed with ourselves and with God when we don't understand the battle we still face. We think something must be wrong with us or with God. So, we really need to understand what is happening during our time here on earth.

The first two statements are false, and the last three are true. Being disciples of Jesus doesn't mean we will have lives with no problems. God just promises that He will walk through the fight with us. He's the commanding officer, and we can trust Him with the plan of attack.

Isn't it amazing that God, in His great mercy, gave us the way to find answers to our questions, to defeat the enemy, and to have victory in our lives? The verses above give us valuable tools to help in our times of weakness and need.

Ephesians 6 talks about the armor of God. This armor not only gives us protection from the flaming darts of the evil one, it also provides salvation, truth, peace, and defense. The devil will come at us from any direction that he thinks we have a weakness. That is why we must be prepared!

What were your thoughts about resisting the devil as discussed in James 4:7? Did you write anything about being humble before God? Good! When we humble ourselves before the Father, He helps us resist. When we do this, the devil must flee. What power we hold through the relationship we enjoy with our God!

In the verses we read for question 3, God gives us another way to combat the enemy our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ! God uses people in our lives to speak truth into us even when it hurts. As we've been learning throughout these last six weeks, we need these relationships to grow! We need to help one another put on the armor of God that we talked about in Ephesians 6. It is also comforting to know that we're not the only ones facing hard times and struggling with the enemy.

According to 2 Corinthians 10:3-5, there are some challenges we face in our walk with Christ. We have to tear these down in order to know God better. Human reasoning, false arguments, and pride can cause us to believe the lies that the world tells us are true. God wants us to be filled with the truth of His Word so that the lies are revealed, and we choose instead to believe the truth.

There is good news! Even though we go through these hard times, and battle the enemy, there is hope in Jesus Christ. John 16:33 encourages us to be strengthened with the fact that Jesus has already overcome the world. Victory!
